New Executive Director takes up the challenge

The recruitment and retention of young doctors to undertake GPR training in the Territory, is the key challenge facing the new Executive Director of Northern Territory General Practice Education Limited (NTGPE), Dr Michael Wilson. Dr Wilson said the Territory was a unique and challenging environment for doctors, but also very rewarding. "Part of our brief is to recruit to training positions throughout the Territory, then get young doctors to consider a career here," he said. "The other part of our job is ensuring professional development is easily accessible to practitioners across the Territory, so they can deliver high quality medical care," Dr Wilson said. Just as important as attracting doctors to the Territory is the challenge of convincing medical students to consider the specialisation of General Practice, he said. "I hope to raise the profile of General Practice as a rewarding profession," he said.

NTGPE is a not-for-profit company formed by a consortium of partners including Aboriginal Medical Services Alliance NT Inc, Charles Darwin and Flinders Universities, the GP Divisions of the NT, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, and the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine. It is based at Charles Darwin University. NTGPE has responsibility for placing General Practice Registrars (undergoing three-year specialist GP training in the Territory), coordinating medical educations, undergraduate placements from Australian medical schools, and

junior doctor placements during their internships in Territory hospitals. One of the challenges facing NTGPE is the national shortage of General Practitioners, which makes it harder to recruit to regional positions, Dr Wilson said. "The first thing I will be doing is talking to the health and medical bodies in the Territory to get a full understanding of the issues and how they might best be addressed," he said.

Dr Wilson has an extensive background in health positions. Originally from Far North Queensland, he has worked as senior health consultant for the Victorian Healthcare Association Global mainly in the Middle East and India. He has also worked with health and educational programs in Uganda, China, Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong, Bhutan, Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia, Norway and Sweden. His last appointment in Australia was as the Director of Nursing, Southern Health, Women's and Children's



Program and concurrently as the Director of Nursing Education and Research, Southern Health Victoria. He has held senior academic appointments at La Trobe, Deakin and Monash Universities and the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, in Victoria. Dr Wilson has an extensive background in senior management, teaching and learning, curriculum development and evaluation, as well as the use of simulation for improving clinical skills and reducing clinical risk. He has been a member of several state government advisory groups with briefs ranging from the review of statewide paediatric services to workforce planning and education preparation of beginning practitioners. He has published in the areas of international health education, the use of simulation in health care education, and healthcare, regulatory frameworks for health care services, strategic health care services planning and addressing the educational needs of health care workers.

Dr Wilson said he was attracted to the Territory position as it allowed him to utilise his varied experience. "I also really enjoy working with groups of people such as General Practitioners and Aboriginal people, and I have a passion for primary health," he said.

Electronic Health Record guru appointed to Chair of NTGPE Board

At the Board meeting of the 11th April Dr Sam Heard was appointed as the new chair. Dr. Sam Heard (MBBS, MRCGP, FRACGP, FACHI) is a general practitioner and has been a Senior Lecturer in General Practice, first with London University and until 2002 with Flinders University. Sam grew up in Naracoorte in South Australia, went to boarding school in Adelaide, studied medicine at Adelaide University and was an intern at Flinders Medical Centre.

After 9 months on a motorbike with his wife in Asia he began his General Practice training in London at St Bartholomew's Hospital. He then became a lecturer in General Practice at London University and took on an inner city General Practice where he worked for 9 years. The practice provided full

obstetric care including home birth and 24-hour cover for 6000 patients. Sam returned to Darwin in 1992 with his wife and 4 children and worked in General Practice at Malak and Menzies School of Health Research. Later he worked with the RACGP and then Flinders University - as Director of

the GP Training Program and Undergraduate Program here in the NT for 9 years to 2002. He developed a GP clinical system in London in the mid 80's, which is still in use and was a co-author of the original Good European Health Record Project funded by the European Commission.

Sam has been researching electronic health records for many years and is presently working with a company called Ocean Informatics to realise the potential of communicating personal health records between systems.

Sam has written and presented widely on electronic health records and was the principal author of the background document for the Australian Electronic Health Record Taskforce. He has been the lead on all the GPCG funded GEHR projects and has developed the clinical approach to the groundbreaking archetypes. He was co-chair of the EHR Technical Committee of HL7 International until 2005 (now on the board of HL7 Australia) and remains Chair of the Standards Australia EHR working group. He also has a strong educational background in primary care and has just completed a 3-year term as the Chair of the National Education Committee of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners.

Plans are afoot for the next Registrar face to face workshop in Darwin at the Airport Resort in June. Ameeta Patel and Christine Lesnikowski are coordinating this and have an initial schedule natted out already, but if you have any thoughts please contact them. Small group meetings continue on a regional basis and we hope

that they continue to evolve and thrive. Feedback so far seems to be generally quite positive. We rely heavily on your feedback here and the Business Session at the workshop will be a good avenue to air your views and compare experiences.

The Registrar Placement Profiles have been published on our website. These will need to be updated and added to as the situation changes at each profile. The RLO's should be able to coordinate this.

We have also been working on an NTGPE Trainers Manual to complement the manual that GPET provides. The manual will serve as a guide to new trainers and a prompt to remind them about educational, supervision and feedback requirements of the job.



We are once again going to advertise and headhunt for a Director of Medical and Cultural Education position and hopefully can update you on this by the next workshop. In June/July also Kathy Jannis will be sending out requests to registrars for term placements for 2007. Please endeavour to get your requests in on time, and remember that although we make every effort to place everyone at their first

choice this is not always possible, sometimes due to unforeseen circumstances. You are probably well aware that there continues to be a desperate shortage of doctors around the Territory, especially in the smaller communities. This, besides impacting on the health of the people in these communities, makes placement of registrars, medical students and doctors even more complicated.

It remains our philosophy that by doing our utmost to continue these programs, and place as many medical officers in remote/rural areas as possible, that we can have some effect on the workplace issue. A proposal is being developed to research the effect of these placements on the NT workforce, looking especially at how many doctors continue to work in the Territory after their training.



In other news, as part of Training Advisor meetings with registrars we plan to introduce the concept of end-of-placement feedback. We will be asking registrars to fill out a feedback form before their TA meetings and be prepared to discuss this with the TA. The feedback form will be shown to the RLO's for comment before we start this process.

GPET AWARDS NOMINATIONS OPEN

Nominations are now open for the 3rd Annual GPET Awards, to be presented at the GPET Convention in Hobart in August. The awards are designed to honour significant contributions from people involved in general practice education and training, including registrars, supervisors, educators and RTP staff. Nominations close on 29 May 2006. There are six GPET Awards:

- GPET Medical Observer GP Registrar of the Year
- GPET Medical Observer GP Supervisor of the Year
- GPET Medical Educator of the Year
- RTP Staff Excellence Award
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Training Award
- RTP Innovation Award

The awards will be judged by a panel of four judges including a registrar, a supervisor, a GPET Board member and a senior medical practitioner nominated by the Convention's host RTP (General Practice Training Tasmania this year). All those involved in general practice education and training can make nominations in all six categories, excluding the four judges and GPET staff. Each award attracts a prize of \$2,500 to be used for professional development or RTP project funding
