

Australian General Practice Training (AGPT) Program 2020:

ACRRM and RACGP overviews

To become a specialist general practitioner in Australia, you are required to obtain fellowship with the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM) and/or the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) and obtain vocational registration as a specialist general practitioner.

Program Structure	12 months Core Clinical Time (CCT), usually completed in hospital. 24 months Primary Rural and Remote Training (PRRT1-4) in ACRRM accredited facilities must include a minimum of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 6 months community primary care • 6 months hospital and emergency care • 12 months rural/remote experience 12 months in Advanced Specialised Training (AST)	12 months Hospital Training Time (HTT) 18 months General Practice (GPT1-3) in RACGP accredited facility/training practices: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 3 x 6 month terms in general practice • 6 months Extended Skills* <small>*Can be undertaken at any stage of your training, with the exception of Aboriginal health or general practice placements which have to be after you have completed GPT1-3.</small>

ARST / AST	<p>AST can be undertaken any time after completing the CCT component. It is recommended that the needs of the community they intend to practice in be taken into consideration when making the choice.</p>	<p>ARST can be undertaken at any time after completing the Hospital training time. It is recommended that the needs of the community they intend to practise in be taken into consideration when making the choice.</p>
